There's been a reduction in Narcotic sales from 2019 to the current date of 2020 but only slightly. On Beat 0313 in 2019 we had 54 incidents and in 2020 we had 26 incidents. Narcotic sales have reduced, however this problem is a high priority due to numerous complaints received by residents at beat meetings and community conversations for the 2021 District Strategic plan.</p>

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>The crime data and calls for service show that shootings have increased by 50% with at total of 177 incidents compared on a 22.9% reduction from 2019 with a total of 118 incidents. Of those reported incidents several occurred within the boundaries of our top Gang Conflict Zones in 2020.</p> <p>According to current statistics, Beat 321 has the highest number of shootings with a total of (26) as of 29 October 2020. This time last year Beat 321 had 12 shootings. Our goal is to reduce the number of Gang Related Calls For Service which will ultimately assist with mitigating crimes associated with gang activity in 2021 in the identified area of concern.</p>

		Offender motives are gang related due to active conflicts or retaliation that may also stem from social media, being a contributing factor. Death anniversary dates are also contributing factors to retaliatory Gun Violence which this celebratory activity tends to increase during the summer months bringing attention, loitering and the possibility to further commit Gun Violence.		
		Offenders have been known to use vehicles some that are rented or stolen, or on foot to approach the victims out on the street using various firearms to commit these acts of gun violence, thus using said vehicles or on foot to get away.
