Be as specific as possible.</i> | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Since the beginning of 2024, there have been a total of 210 motor vehicle thefts in a specific area of 811 and 814's Beat (47th-59th / Narragansett to Lamon Ave). That is an increase of 78% when compared to the same time frame as last year.</li> <li>A large percentage of the vehicles taken during this year's dramatic increase are various Kia and Hyundai models. District intelligence shows that this trend is due to the popular social media posts regarding the "Kia Challenge." The Kia Challenge is a series of videos showing a few simple steps to start the engine of various Kia and Hyundai models using a USB cord. Since these posts went viral, the number of motor vehicle thefts has dramatically increased.</li> <li>Furthermore, Jeep and Dodge vehicles are being targeted as reprogramming devices are more common among vehicle thieves. This tactic often involves the breaking of a window to gain access to the vehicle and plugging in the reprogramming device in to the diagnostic port within the vehicle to reprogram a key fob and be able to start and steal the vehicle. A majority of the Dodge and Jeep vehicles being targeted are high end performance model vehicles and are being used to commit various other crimes due to their speed and handling capabilities, also making it hard for police to catch.</li> </ul> |  |   |   |   |

Be as specific as possible.</i> | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>In recent years, a new trend began with groups of car clubs gathering at various locations throughout the 8th District. As this trend gained in popularity, the number of cars greatly increases and the volatility of the gatherings became a major concern. The gatherings would take place at several intersections and private lots throughout the district. The three main locations are the Ford City Mall parking lot, the Pulaski Promenade parking lot and the intersection at 5000 S. Cicero.</li> <li>In 2024 there were 537 calls for service for drag racing and reckless driving along Pulaski and Cicero Ave. Compared to last year, there were 478 calls for service. This shows an increase and this issue continues to create an unsafe environment for pedestrians and motorists in the affected areas.</li> <li>This issue was a main topic of concern at recent beat meetings as well as both community conversations.</li> </ul> |   |   |   |   |

Be as specific as possible.</i>  | <p>1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s)?</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The reckless drivers create a very dangerous environment for other motorists as well as pedestrians crossing the street. The traffic congestion along Pulaski and Cicero Ave causes the offending drivers to disobey traffic signals as well as cross into on-coming traffic. Travelling at high speeds can cause fatal traffic crashes.</li> </ul>   |   |   |   |

The drivers will communicate through various social media platforms to decide where and when to meet. As the groups travel from one location to the next, they will drive in dangerous manner while disregarding traffic signals and placing pedestrians and motorists in danger of being struck. In many cases, the groups use the vehicles to form a large circle in the middle of an intersection or in a large parking lot to allow vehicles to do a dangerous maneuver known as drifting.</li> </ul> |   |   |   |
