Be as specific as possible.</i>	Through a comprehensive search of crime data and calls for service it was determined Beat 0914 sustained a 172.2% increase in the amount of documented robberies involving a firearm in 2021 compared to 2020. These findings were bolstered by numerous complaints about robberies at the beat meetings for 0914 and additionally at the annual community conversations for district strategic planning.

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s)?</i></p> <p>The victims tend to be older adults and younger women, usually walk alone to or from red line stations in the area. As well as unsuspecting tourists frequenting the area due to the transient nature of the area. Business Owners suffer as potential customers do not feel safe and will not frequent the area.</p>

Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</i></p> <p>Offenders normally approach on foot or exiting a vehicle while wearing dark colored clothing. Offenders have been found to conceal their identity by covering their faces. In the majority of cases Offenders have stated they have a weapon prior to demanding the victim's personal belongings and mostly flee using alley and side streets as their avenue of escape. Due to the sporadic nature, it is difficult to pin down an actual motivation of the offender(s) to commit these crimes.</p>

Be as specific as possible.</i>	Within the listed boundaries, a 50% increase in homicides and 60% increase in shootings are noted for the 2021 calendar year. Despite sustaining this increase, calls for service related to shots fired and persons shot have only increased 14% during the same time period. Over the 2019 & 2020 calendar years, a dramatic 90% decrease in these numbers was achieved.

Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <p>The true victims are the citizens living in the area that constantly feel unsafe due to the amount of shooting incidents plaguing this community. Business owners suffer financially as patrons fear coming to the area, thus hurting their businesses.</p> <p>The families of these victims suffer the loss of loved ones, causing severe and deep rooted feelings of loss and hurt. Sometimes, these family members become so irate, they in turn focus on their energies on seeking vengeance. These acts cause an endless circle of violence in these communities.</p> <p>Sadly, the actual victim(s) of these shootings do not realize their pain and suffering until it's too late. There has been a trend in which victims have used social media platforms while calling for acts of violence to take place upon them. Unfortunately these calls are answered far too often, and the outcome is a victim, now regretting the decision they made. The argument could be made these victims need mentoring, religion and structure in their lives, which should help them in seeing the error of their ways.</p>

Additionally, the 009th Abandoned Policing Officers will identify vacant lots and collaborate with city services to get the areas cleaned up as well as fenced in. Ensure that 311 requests are done to ensure all public lighting in the area is fixed.</p>

The identified watches will determine the window of time when shootings spike on their watch. Request assistance from Community Safety Teams to address spikes in violence. Any acts of violence can be quickly reviewed, and verified information can be dispatched to the patrol vehicles in real time.</p>

Weather is an obvious factor in deterring crime. Additionally, acts of civil unrest and redeployment of officers will also have repercussions. In order to have a clearer picture into whether or not our strategies are in fact working, a period of 4-6 months would be optimal. Seeing a continued and sustained decrease in the amount of documented incidents would ensure our strategies are working.</i></p>				
<p>Mitigation Criteria <i>Explain how you will specifically know when the problem can be considered "addressed". Consider both quantitative and qualitative approaches.</i></p>	<p>The problem will be addressed when we see a significant decline not only in the amount of calls for service but in the amount of documented incidents. Although we must also keep in mind that success can only be attained if the documented strategies continue to work and show steady declines. Otherwise, independent variables could be responsible for a momentary decline. Ideally, if our numbers matched those pre-2021 this problem would be considered addressed.</p>

Within a two year time frame, a 77% increase in the amount of shootings/aggravated batteries has been sustained. While sustaining such dramatic increases in these numbers we have seen a single digit increases in the amount of calls for service. This trend can be attributed to citizens not fearing retaliation for calling for police services. There are no peak times as these violent crimes continue to take place across all three watches during all times of the day and night.</p>
