YTD 2021 BT 1223 had 12% of the shooting incidents in the 012th District and 16% of the homicide incidents. BT 1223 had 80 calls of shots fired in 2021 and 492 calls that were violence and gang related. In comparison to 2020 BT 1223 had a +1% increase in shots fired calls and a8% decrease in violence and gang related calls. The percentage of change is small so the numbers of calls are relatively the same for 2021 vs 2020.
