During the timeframe 01Jan2021-10Oct2021 a total of sixty three (63) Aggravated Vehicular Hijackings occurred and a total of fifteen (15) Vehicular Hijackings compared to 01JAN2020-05NOV2020 timeframe a total of twenty eight (28) Aggravated Vehicular Hijacking and a total of twelve (12) Vehicular Hijackings. The highest number of 2021 Aggravated Vehicular Hijackings and Vehicular Hijackings have occurred on Beat 1434 and 1424.
