Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>From 1 Jan 2019 to 30 Sep 2020, Aggravated batteries with a firearm and homicides accounted for the majority of violent incidents within the 015th District. Several gangs operating within the boundaries of the district were involved in these incidents and the nature of the conflicts which gave rise to these shootings were varied. Additionally, no beat in the district went unaffected.</p> <p>The 5500 block of West Congress since 01 Apr 2019 has experienced a 100% increase in shootings. Beat 1522 overall has an 80% increase in Aggravated Batteries and Homicides since 1 Jan 2019.</p> <p>From September 2019 to September 2020 on the 500 Block of North Pine there has been a 200% increase in shootings</p> <p>Beat 1511 (36 % Increase) Beat 1512 (450% Increase).</p>

Victims have been innocent bystanders being adults and youth ranging from 3-17 years of age. Large groups are also targeted.</p>

In some cases, the vehicle was later found to be reported stolen. Offenders are using semi-automatic handguns and/or assault rifles to carry out these crimes. The method of escape is on foot or an awaiting vehicle.</p>

The Community Policing office will collaborate with community partners of the Austin Response Team (ART) taking proactive measures to address potential areas of conflict and a reactive measure to areas which have reported shooting incidents.</p> <p><i>Enforcement response (if applicable):</i> The 015th District will be monitoring calls for service regarding shots fired, conducting outdoor roll calls along with curfew and other related missions and utilizing Intradepartmental Service Request forms to request outside units assist in areas which aggravated batteries with a firearm and homicides have occurred.</p>

Heavy volume of loitering that occurs in front of local businesses and residences is a leading prominent concern from community stakeholders. Narcotics loitering is related to and associated with the violence in the district making it a high priority for community and public safety.</p> <p>From September 2019 to September 2020, Beat 1533 had a significant decrease in Narcotic Related Arrests (54%) and a slight decrease in Vice Calls for Service (25%). However, due to pro-active police crime strategies, a zero tolerance of gang and narcotic activity will continue to aim at reducing calls for service, narcotic related incidents and arrests.</p>

They both are utilized for criminal activity.</p> <p>From September 2019 to September 2020, the number of identified abandoned buildings (9) stayed consistent, with a 25% decrease in all crimes reported along with a 26% decrease in calls for service. The completion and monitoring of city service request helps to address issues which enable chronic crime and disorder conditions.</p>
