Be as specific as possible.</i>	Theft from auto district-wide remains a pervasive problem regularly discussed at beat meetings, community conversations, and on social media outlets. Theft overall accounts for 48% of 2021 Compstat crime in the 16 th district, with an increase of 53% over 2020. Theft from auto accounts for approximately 42% of total thefts, with beat 1633 experiencing 25% of that. Overall, theft from auto experienced a 75% increase in 2021.

Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</i> A considerable number of theft from auto reports continue to be related to catalytic converter thefts, (pattern P21-5-102.) Vehicles with multiple occupants approach parked/unoccupied vehicles in overnight hours; offenders have brandished weapons when witnesses approach, and then flee in vehicles. Other thefts from auto reports include valuables taken from inside vehicles, wherein valuables were left exposed/ visible. Offenders often look for vehicles that are left unlocked, making them an easy target.

Be as specific as possible.</i>	Although there has been an overall decrease in robberies of 6% for 2021 v 2020, the community continues to express concern at community conversations, and other events and community meetings. A subset, vehicular hijackings, continues to cause angst among community members. The district experienced a 43% increase in vehicular hijackings in 2021. Approximately 30% of total robberies occurred within the boundaries herein identified.

Offenders generally approach victim from behind and commonly demand money and cell phones. Offenders conceal their identity with face masks and/or hoodies and tend to flee on foot or in a car along nearby side streets. More than half of robberies occur on 3 rd watch, but all watches are affected.

Community concerns have been expressed during beat meetings, community interactions, events and community conversations. Approximately 32% of 2021 burglaries occurred on beats 1622, 1623 and 1624.
