There have been 6 juvenile victims so far this year and 14 female victims. The overwhelming majority of victims have a criminal history (82%) and many of them are documented gang members. 5. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc. The shootings usually occur in gang territories and are often related to gang conflict and narcotic sales. The offenders typically use handguns and flee in a vehicle. Oftentimes, the offender shoots directly from said vehicle and flees the scene at a high rate of speed.
