Statistically, the victims of these crimes, in most cases, are familiar with the offender or have some knowledge of who might be firing at them.

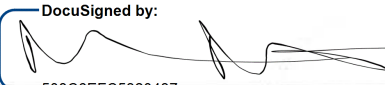
