Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>005th District priority problem #1 has been identified as HOMICIDES. According to data that has been obtained from the Strategic Decision Support Center (SDSC) Analyst, Calls for service and the community conversations there is a documented increase in violent crimes. To date shootings and homicides have increased on the South end of the 005th District. This information is based on incidents that occurred 01 JAN 2022 TO 08 NOV 2022. The highest concentration of these activities occurred on Beat 533 and 523. Beat 533 encompasses the area o 130th to 138th Michigan to the Doty Road .Beat 523 encompasses the area of 120th to 129th place State Street to Carpenter Street. To date 005th district has had 5000 calls for service – 3,103 Shot Spotter Alerts – 14,145 rounds -44 homicides and 155 Aggravated Batteries with a handgun.</p>

The 005th District -victims of the shootings and homicides are majority male black between the ages of 15 to 35. The community as well as families are victims. The fear and unrest in the neighborhoods due to these shootings cause the entire city to be victims.</p>		
		<p>2. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc. Through community conversations and social media research and detective dialogue it has been determined that the motive of the majority of HOMICIDES / shootings and aggravated batteries is gang affiliation, retaliation, narcotic sales, and most recently conflicts on social media. Statics state that offenders are becoming younger in age which leads to the understanding that older individuals are soliciting younger individuals to join in gang activities and also these younger individuals are influenced by social media and peer pressure.</p>

The offenders often flee in a waiting vehicle which is most times a previously reported stolen vehicle.</p>



