Be as specific as possible.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Beginning in early Spring of 2021, groups of car clubs would gather in the parking lot of Ford City Mall. As this trend gained in popularity, car clubs from other parts of the city and suburbs began to travel along the Stevenson Expressway, into the 8<sup>th</sup> District to join the group. This trend, along with the use of social media outlets to coordinate meeting locations created a massive increase in 911 calls related to drag racing and reckless driving along Pulaski Road from 155 to 76<sup>th</sup> Street.</li> <li>In 2022 there were 362 calls for service for drag racing along Pulaski Rd. Compared to last year, there were 119 calls, which is an increase of 204%.</li> <li>In 2022 there were 105 calls for service for reckless driving along Pulaski Rd. Compared to last year, there were 112. Even though we saw a slight decrease from last year, 105 calls of reckless driving on a single stretch of road is a dangerous statistic.</li> <li>This issue was a main topic of concern at recent beat meetings as well as both Community Conversations.</li> </ul>

Who is / are the victim(s)?</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The drag racers and drifters create a very dangerous environment for other motorists as well as pedestrians crossing the street. The traffic congestion along Pulaski Rd causes the offending drivers to disobey traffic signals as well as cross into on-coming traffic. Travelling at high speeds can cause fatal traffic crashes.</li> </ul>			
		<b>2. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>In most cases, the offenders are driving recklessly from the Stevenson Expressway to Ford City Mall via Pulaski Rd. The drivers will communicate through various social media platforms to decide where and when to meet. As the groups travel from one location to the next, they will drive in dangerous manner while disregarding traffic signals and placing pedestrians and motorists in danger of being struck. In many cases, the groups use the vehicles to form a large circle in the middle of an intersection or in a large parking lot to allow vehicles to do a dangerous maneuver known as drifting.</li> </ul>

Each weekend, several hundred vehicles from various parts of the city and suburbs gather at a pre-determined location and time. While these vehicles travel to and from the meeting points, they drive in a dangerous and reckless manner.</li> </ul>

By attending community meetings and events and monitoring social media posts, we will truly be able to determine if community members feel comfortable living and working in the neighborhood without fear of becoming a victim.</li></ul>

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Historically, the Scottsdale neighborhood has a gang conflict between the Ambrose and the Krazy Getdown Boys (KGB's) which tends to flare up occasionally. In recent months, this conflict has shown a more consistent level of gang violence and increased activity that has become a much larger issue. Since the beginning of 2022, the 8<sup>th</sup> District SDSC room detected 195 shot spotter hits within the Scottsdale community, which is an increase of 38% from last year. In addition, there has been a 67% increase in gang related shootings in this area compared to last year. Statistics also show a 72% increase in violent comp stat crime compared to last year. Along with those statistics, there have been several beat meetings, town halls and community conversations where the increase in recent gang activity was a main topic of conversation.</li> </ul>

Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The residents of Scottsdale are the true victims of this priority. The community that resides between Ford City Drive and 87<sup>th</sup> St/Pulaski to Cicero have had their property damaged by stray bullets and gang graffiti, their property stolen to support gang activity and had their freedom of living in a safe community taken from them.</li> </ul> <p>5. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Traditionally, gang members will claim a geographical area as their territory and attempt to push the boundaries of that area, causing conflict with surrounding gangs. Once these conflicts are initiated, each group will begin marking their territory with gang graffiti, and attempt to defend it with gun violence. In order to fund the gang activity, most sell narcotics and stolen goods to generate revenue.</li> <li>The KGB's (Krazy Getdown Boys) are the primary gang residing in the Scottsdale area and have caused an increase in shootings, drug sales, gang disturbances and gang graffiti. If members of their primary rival gang (Ambrose) approach the Scottsdale area, the conflict intensifies between both sides which usually results in some type of violent activity.</li> </ul>

Since the KGB's reside in Scottsdale, they are the root cause. A strong police presence and cooperation from the community will be a positive step to rid this gang from Scottsdale and hopefully solve this issue.</li> </ul>



