From Jan 1, 2022 to Oct 10, 2022 there were 2447 calls for service in regards to narcotic activity.</p> <p>Beat 1112 had 2447 calls for service Beat 1121 had 629 calls for service Beat 1132 had 643 calls for service</p> <p>Despite that being a 47% decrease from the same period of 2021, narcotic sales continue to be a major cause for concern on the part of the residents of the 11th District. In addition to being a debilitating factor to quality of life, narcotic sales continue to be the primary driver of gang violence.</p>

These traumas stem from a variety of reasons from absentee parent(s), drug / alcohol addicted parent(s), parents or family members suffering from mental illness or being victims of shootings and or murder. The lack of education and ability to take advantage of the resources available, feeds and maintains the cycle of violence.</p>
