Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>A Search of crime data revealed that the 012th District had 108 shooting incidents in 2022 YTD. Of those 108 shooting incidents BT 1225 ranks #1 with (17) incidents, which is 16% of the total number of shooting. In comparison to YTD 2021, BT 1225 had only (8) shooting incidents showing an increase of +113%. When measuring against the end of year 2021 BT 1225 had (11) total shooting incidents. End of year 2021 vs YTD 2022 shows an increase of +55% as of 02 Nov 2022.</p> <p>YTD (40) guns have been recovered on BT 1225 in comparison to (14) guns YTD 2021, showing an increase of +185.7%.</p> <p>Gun arrest have also increased on BT 1225, YTD 2022, with BT 1225 having (22) arrest. In 2021 BT 1225 had only (10) arrest showing an increase of +120%</p>

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s)?</i></p> <p>The Victims tend to be younger adult / teenage males who have a connection to gang or drug activity in the area. Additionally, residents and innocent bystanders are also at risk of being struck by stray bullets fired during these incidents.</p>

Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</i></p> <p>The Offender(s) frequently makes his/her approach using a vehicle, many times stolen, shooting a gun in the direction of their intended target. Offender(s) then immediately flee the area after committing the crime. Their motive is to inflict harm and terrorize their intended victim(s).</p>

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>There are currently three on going gang conflicts on BT 1225 over narcotic sales and territory. The conflict is between the Black Disciples Gang and Mafia Insane Vice Lords; known as gang conflict GC-A3-012-013. The Black Disciples Gang are also in conflict with the Traveling Vice Lords in the same area, GC-A3-012-004. The current conflicts amongst the listed gangs are the driving force behind the shooting and violence in the area. In addition, the fight over drug territory in area is contributing to the increase in shooting incidents.</p>

Additionally, the Community Policing Office and City services will identify vacant lots in the area that are being used for gang and narcotic purposes. This will help to ensure that the areas are cleaned up, well-lit and secured as necessary. Dissemination by the Community Policing Office and Bike Team, of public safety information flyers and publications regarding crime safety tips and crime awareness.

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>YTD 2022 the 012th District has had 478 robbery incidents. BT 1215 leads the district in robbery incidents with a total of (54) incidents, 11% of the total number of robberies. YTD 2021 BT 1215 had only 33 incidents which shows an increase of +21 incidents or +64%. BT 1215 End of Year 2021 had 49 robbery incidents in comparison to YTD 2022, up +5 incidents or +10%.</p> <p>BT 1215 also ranks #1 in vehicular hijackings related robberies with a total of 17 incidents YTD. In comparison to YTD 2021, with only 15 incidents, an increase of +13% for 2022.</p>

Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <p>There are no particular types of victims due to Robberies being a crime of opportunity. Many victims are unaccompanied persons that are inattentive to their surroundings and tend to be distracted by their cellular and listening devices.</p> <p>5. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</p> <p>The offender(s) are often armed young adults (youth) searching for an unsuspecting or distracted victim in a motor vehicle or out in the public. The offender(s) will use an "ambush style" approach not allowing the victim any reaction time. The offender(s) are armed with a weapon and work with an accomplice(s) demanding that the victim(s) turn over their property. If the victim attempts to resist, offender(s) will resort to physical force or violence to obtain what they want.</p>

Offenders are also working together with another perpetrator to overwhelm the victim and take their belongings. In addition, the offender(s) are known individuals who oftentimes repeat their offenses due to lack of prosecution. Vehicles taken during the robbery are also used to commit many subsequent criminal acts.</p>

Non-enforcement strategies must be included.</i>	<b>Non-enforcement response (required):</b> The goal is to increase awareness in the community by hosting Public Safety meetings, business walks, and dissemination of safety tips flyers encouraging residents to take preventative steps to avoid becoming a target. Educational and informative programs co-created with the police department for youth and young adults.		
		<b>Enforcement response (if applicable):</b> The 012 <sup>th</sup> District will conduct Traffic Missions utilizing ALPR (license plate reader) technology along with SDSC missions utilizing the same technology to locate stolen vehicles. The districts Community Policing Office along with the Bike Team will distribute public safety flyers in the affected area to help raise awareness as well as participating in Community Public Safety meetings. Social Media outlets will also be utilized as a means of informing and sharing information on safety. Community Policing Youth Liaison Officers will be tasked to host and co-host events designed to educate and interact with youth and young adults.

Weekly SDSC meetings will also take place to measure the effectiveness of the implemented strategies. Information from the SDSC meeting will be shared with all officers in the district via the SDSC room briefing report.  The problem will be considered "addressed" when the number of Robberies and associated violent crime incidents substantially drops. Another measure to determine if the problem has been addressed is to encourage feedback from community members that resides and works in the affected area through Beat and Public Safety Meetings.

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>A search of crime data reveals the 012th District had 1723 theft incident YTD with BT 1214 ranking #1 with a total of 394 incidents, 23% of the total theft. Of those (394) total theft incidents, BT 1214 had 314 incidents or 80% that are theft from auto related. BT 1214 had +170 more theft from auto incidents than BT 1215, the #2 ranking beat for theft from auto in the 012th District.</p> <p>In 2021 YTD BT 1214 had only 291 incidents of theft from auto showing an increase of +23 incidents or +8% in comparison to 2022 YTD.</p>			
	<b>Problem Analysis</b> <i>Explain the problem by describing each of the listed elements. Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>7. Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <p>Victims tend to be individuals who leave valuables inside their parked vehicles, most often visible to Offender(s) from the outside of the vehicle. Most victims in the affected area are visitors to the entertainment district and utilize street parking in dark and isolated areas. Unsecured parking lots are also known to be targeted by thieves. Catalytic converter thefts are also a substantial cause to the increase in the crime data.</p>			
		<p>8. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</p> <p>Offender(s) commit these acts by checking for unlocked car doors and resorting to damaging windows to get access into the vehicle. Vehicles are selected by thieves based on what valuables they can observe through the window. The theft of catalytic converters is conducted very differently. Offenders work together in a crew consisting of 2 to 3 individuals which are each assigned a task; a driver, a lookout and the person tasked to remove the catalytic converter from under the vehicle. It is very common for one of the individuals, usually the lookout, to be armed with a weapon.</p>
