Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>After a thorough search and based off of 2022 crime data and calls for service Robberies and Vehicular Hijackings have increased in the district from 2021. Overall for the district (2022-336 Robberies) and (2021- 241 Robberies) 39.4% increase. Beat 1924 (43 Robberies), 1925 (37 Robberies) and 1933,34,35 (30 Robberies) were the top highest in the district.</p> <p>Vehicular Hijackings have increased by 701% with a total for the district in 2022 being 45 and in the year 2021 (42 vehicular hijackings). Beat 1935 had the highest number of vehicular hijackings.</p> <p>This area is frequented by Chicago residents as well as tourists. The area is also known as the entertainment area. Robberies are categorized as both armed and strong arm robberies. There have been documented incidents occurring on or near the CTA Red Line.</p> <p>The 019th District is a host to many brick and mortar liquor licenses in the City of Chicago. Due to the vibrant entertainment scene victims who are inebriated are targeted.</p>

Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</p> <p>Offenders normally approach on foot as well as in vehicles when the robberies are committed. They usually use the CTA Red Line to escape as well as have vehicles waiting for them after the robbery is committed. Offenders imply the presence of a weapon and may display one during the commission of the offense.</p> <p>In regards to the vehicular hijacking offenders may arrive to the area using public transportation or use another stolen vehicle to commit a vehicular hijacking. There are many instances when the offenders loiter in an area and wait for individuals to leave their vehicles running while they patronize restaurants for takeout or are</p>			

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		unloading personal belongings. The offenders then leave the area quickly with the victim's vehicle by using Lake Shore Drive as an escape route.

The top 3 beats with the highest incidents are Beats (1922 with 42 Burglaries), (1914 with 38 Burglaries) and (1911 with 35 Burglaries). Overall there has been a 26.2% increase in Burglaries. Concerns and complaints from citizens at beat meetings and the Community Conversations further revealed that this is a top priority for the district.</p>

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>Quality of life concerns are a top priority for the 019th District. Complaints received from residents at Beat meetings, as well as the Community Conversations have directed attention to this situation. A thorough search of calls for service reveals there was a total of 2,128 calls. In 2021 this number was higher at 2,328 when compared to the same time frame. Although the number is lower in 2022, the residents regularly communicate their concerns and their perception is that the situation has become troublesome. This was reinforced during the Community Conversations and a variety of issues were discussed such as; gang loitering, narcotics loitering, drinking on the public way, selling loose cigarettes, and the circumstance affecting the homeless population.</p>

The offenders have a strong presence in and around the CTA red line stations within the 019th District. With respect to the gang and narcotics activity the offenders use parking lots and the heavily trafficked business area for concealment. The areas are then used as a means to exert control and establish a gang presence. Due to this activity other activities are occurring such as consuming alcoholic beverages and the illicit use of narcotics by residents and the homeless population.</p>




