Be as specific as possible.</p> <p>A Search of crime data revealed that the 012th District had (93) shooting incidents in 2023 YTD as of 02 Nov 23. In 2022 the 012th District had 108 shooting incidents YTD showing a decrease of -14% or 15 incidents for 2023.</p> <p>Of those 93 shooting incidents BT 1233 ranks #1 with (13) incidents followed closely by BT 1231 and BT 1232 with (12) shootings and BT 1234 with (11) shootings. In fact, the -30- sector of the 12th District has a total of (54) shooting incidents which accounts for 58% of the total number of shootings incidents across the 012th District. In comparison to the same time last year, the -30- sector is up (+8) incidents or +8%.</p> <p>YTD (329) guns have been recovered in the 012th district with 50% or (164) guns being recovered in the -30- sector. The top (3) 012th District Beats with the most gun recoveries, YTD, are BT 1233 with (43), BT 1234 with (43), and BT 1235 with (33).</p> | | |

Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <p>The Victims tend to be younger adult / teenage males who have a connection to gang or drug activity in the area. Additionally, residents and innocent bystanders are also at risk of being struck by stray bullets fired during these incidents.</p> <p>2. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</p> <p>The Offender(s) frequently makes his/her approach using a vehicle, many times stolen, shooting a gun in the direction of their intended target. Offender(s) then immediately flee the area after committing the crime. Their motive is to inflict harm and terrorize their intended victim(s) and the community.</p> | | |

The high level gang conflict of GC-A3-012-001 Satan Disciples/La Raza vs Ambrose, recently, has experienced an uptick in gang activity and acts of retaliatory violence. The current conflicts amongst the listed gangs are the driving force behind the shooting and violence in not only the 012th District but the neighboring districts of 010, 009 and 008.</p> | | |

Non-enforcement strategies must be included.</i> | <i>Non-enforcement response (required):</i> The 12 th District will work with the Community Safety Intervention Unit to conduct Intervention Connections with the identified gang member(s) with ties to the gang and narcotic sales in the specified area. The team will also connect with potential persons targeted for retaliation. Additionally, the Community Policing Office and City services will identify vacant lots in the area that are being used for gang and narcotic purposes. This will help to ensure that the areas are cleaned up, well-lit and secured as necessary. Dissemination by the Community Policing Office and Bike Team, of public safety information flyers and publications regarding crime safety tips and crime awareness. | | |
| | | <i>Enforcement response (if applicable):</i> The 012 th District Tactical Teams and Patrol Officers will conduct Shooting Missions during the identified hours of conflict. Be as specific as possible.</i> | <p>YTD 2023 the 012th District has had 794 robbery incidents as of 02 Nov 23. YTD 2022 the 012th District had only 482 robberies which is an increase of +65% or +312 incidents. Due to the recent upticks in robberies across the city the 012th district has already surpassed last year total of 640 robberies by 154 incidents.</p> <p>BT 1234 leads the district in robbery incidents with a total of (97) incidents YTD, 12% of the total number of robberies in the 012th District. YTD 2022 BT 1234 had only (24) incidents which shows and increase of (+73) incidents, or +300%. In comparison to the end of year robbery for BT 1234 in 2022, which was (39) incidents, BT 1234 has surpassed last year robberies numbers by (+58) incidents or +148%.</p> | | | |

Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <p>There are no particular types of victims due to Robberies being a crime of opportunity. Many victims are unaccompanied persons that are inattentive to their surroundings and tend to be distracted by their cellular and listening devices. Offenders are targeting individuals in the early morning hours between 0400 and 0800 Hrs, with 50% of the robberies occurring during that time. The offenders are in vehicles, targeting victims either on their way to work, usually on the sidewalk or entering their vehicle, and the offenders are armed with handguns. The offenders are also targeting local street vendors and the clients who patronize their businesses in the early morning hours.</p> | | | |
| | | <p>5. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</p> <p>The offender(s) are often armed young adults (youth) searching for an unsuspecting or distracted victim in a motor vehicle or out in the public. The offender(s) will use an "ambush style" approach not allowing the victim any reaction time. The offender(s) is armed with a weapon and works with another accomplice(s) demanding that the victim(s) turn over their property. If the victim attempts to resist, the offender(s) will resort to physical force or violence to obtain what they want. The offender(s) often abandon the vehicle after a robbery spree or hijack another vehicle during the robbery to avoid detection.</p> | | | |

Non-enforcement strategies must be included.</i> | Non-enforcement response (required): The goal is to increase awareness in the community by hosting Public Safety meetings, business walks, and dissemination of safety tips flyers encouraging citizens to take preventative steps to avoid becoming a target. Educational and informative programs co-created with the police department for youth and young adults. Enforcement response (if applicable): The 012 th District will conduct Traffic Missions utilizing ALPR (license plate reader) technology along with SDSC missions utilizing the same technology to locate stolen vehicles. The districts Community Policing Office along with the Bike Team will distribute public safety flyers in the affected area to help raise awareness as well as participating in Community Public Safety meetings. Social Media outlets will also be utilized as a means of informing and sharing information on safety. The Business Liaison Officer will meet with business associations to discuss prevention and safety in the affected areas. Encourage businesses to enroll in the OEMC camera program. In comparison to the same time last year the 012th District had only (972) incidents, which is an increase of 83% or (+807) incidents.</p> <p>BT 1215 YTD has had (200) MVT or 11% of the total number of thefts. In 2022, YTD, BT 1215 had only (62) incidents showing an increase of +223% or 138 incidents as of 02 Nov. BT 1215 end of year 2022 had (200) MVT which is the current number of theft on said Beat as of 02 Nov 2023. MVT on BT 1215 tend to occur during 3rd Watch predominantly between 1800-2100 HRS.</p> | | | | | | |
| Analysis | Problem Analysis <i>Explain the problem by describing each of the listed elements. Be as specific as possible.</i> | <p>7. Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <p>Victims tend to be individuals who own KIA or Hyundai vehicles that do not have anti-theft technology installed. Unsecured and dark parking lots are also known to be targeted by thieves, as well as dark streets.</p> | | | | | | |
| | | <p>8. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</p> <p>Due to the recent Tick tock trend involving Kia and Hyundai vehicles, said vehicles are the most targeted across the 012th district. The offenders are breaking out the rear windows to the vehicles to gain entry, peeling the steering column, and using a USB or tool to start the vehicle. The stolen vehicles are often used in the commission of robberies or burglaries in the 012th District.
