Although these are numbers that are trending in the right direction, this will still be a high priority for the men and women of the 017 th District because the protection of human life is our main objective. As in the past, gangs and handguns are the direct contributor to the number of incidents. Residents in all parts of the 017 District respond to any shooting incidents with a high priority. Community members address their concerns to local Aldermanic Offices, hold meetings in their respective neighborhood associations and attend beat meetings in larger numbers.
