Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>Based off of 2023 crime data; Robberies and Vehicular Hijackings continue to be our priority in the 019th district. Overall in 2023, 345 Robberies, both armed and strong arm, have been reported compared to 2022 where 336 Robberies were reported. This gives the district a 1.8% increase. The 20 sector was most affect by robberies in 2023. Beats 1924 had the most reported with 41, followed by 1922 with 33, 1923 with 31, and lastly 1925 with 27. Other beats having significant reported robberies were 1912 and 1934 with each having 26 incidents reported. Most incidents occurred on 1st watch with 187, followed by 3rd watch with 102, and lastly 2nd watch with 56. Vehicular Hijackings have by remained steady with, at the time of this report, 43 incidents reported in 2023 compared with 45 in 2022. Beat 1922 had the highest number of incidents with 7, followed by 1924 and 1934 with 5 each. These areas are frequented by many residents and tourists due to the many restaurants, bars, and other venues. There have been many incidents occurring on or near the CTA Red Line. Due to the vibrant entertainment scene of the 19th District, victims tend to be inebriated are and become easy targets for offenders.</p>

They usually use the CTA Red Line to escape as</p>		

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		<p>well as have vehicles waiting for them after the robbery is committed. Offenders imply the presence of a weapon or display one during the commission of the offense. In regards to the vehicular hijacking offenders may arrive to the area using public transportation or use another stolen vehicle to commit a vehicular hijacking. There are many instances when the offenders loiter in an area and wait for individuals to leave their vehicles running while they patronize restaurants for takeout or are unloading personal belongings. The offenders then leave the area quickly with the victim's vehicle by using Lake Shore Drive as an escape route.</p>

The beats with the Beats with the highest number of reported incidents are as follows: 1911 with 54, 1922 with 48, and 1932 with 41. Concerns and complaints from residents at beat meetings and the Community Conversations further revealed that this is a top priority for the district.</p>

They case areas and perform "soft checks" of targets by pulling on residential/garage doors and windows to ascertain if they were left unlocked. Offenders use a variety of escape methods including fleeing the scene on foot, bicycles or vehicles.</p>

Also, the amount of packages left unsecured on the properties targeted.</p>

Non-enforcement strategies must be included.</i>	<i>Non-enforcement response (required):</i> <p>Our non-enforcement responses will include our 19<sup>th</sup> District Community Policing Office conducting Home safety seminars, as well as working with Block clubs and neighborhood organizations in conjunction with our ongoing beat meetings. We will also conduct positive loitering missions.</p>		
		<i>Enforcement response (if applicable):</i> <p>The 19<sup>th</sup> District Watch personnel will ensure beat integrity and conduct foot patrols of beats. Tactical Teams will conduct regular Burglary Missions during the timeframes and on the beats which the most burglary incidents occur. District Bike Teams will proactively patrol affected areas for an added police presence.</p> <p>It should be noted that the 19th District will continue its "Retail Corridor" plan to address retail thefts. Complaints received from residents at Beat meetings, as well as the Community Conversations have directed attention to this situation. 19<sup>th</sup> district residents regularly communicate their concerns, and their perception is that the crime situation in the district, as well as city wide, is troublesome. This was reinforced during the Community Conversations and a variety of issues were discussed such as; gang loitering, narcotics loitering, drinking on the public way, selling loose cigarettes, and the circumstance affecting the homeless population.</p>

The areas are then used as a means to exert control and establish a gang presence. Due to this activity other activities are occurring such as consuming alcoholic beverages and the illicit use of narcotics by residents and the homeless population.</p>


