Scanning	Rationale <i>Explain why this is a top priority for your district. Provide specific numbers for calls for service and/or crime data to support your explanation. Be as specific as possible.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Since the beginning of 2024, there have been a total of 210 motor vehicle thefts in a specific area of 811 and 814's Beat (47th-59th / Narragansett to Lamon Ave). That is an increase of 78% when compared to the same time frame as last year. Hyundai and Kia model vehicle are still falling victim to theft at a high rate due to models that were manufactured from approximately 2010 to 2020 lack what Kia and Hyundai refers to as a "crucial anti-theft feature called an engine immobilizer". Infiniti brand vehicles are frequently targeted as a result of their perceived value to be re-sold. Infiniti model vehicles are a common vehicle that is seen in our districts second priority #2 during street takeovers. Infiniti model vehicles have easier theft methods as opposed to other vehicles and are said to have vulnerable security systems, that are easy to bypass by thieves. Furthermore, Jeep and Dodge vehicles are being targeted as reprogramming devices are more common among vehicle thieves. This tactic often involves the breaking of a window to gain access to the vehicle and plugging in the reprogramming device in to the diagnostic port within the vehicle to reprogram a key fob and be able to start and steal the vehicle. A majority of the Dodge and Jeep vehicles being targeted are high end performance model vehicles and are being used to commit various other crimes due to their speed and handling capabilities, also making it hard for police to catch.

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s)?</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Because the large number of vehicles being stolen in our districts target area, the victims are not necessarily specific to one particular group. The prevalence of reprogramming devices for Dodge and Jeep vehicles increased likelihood for owners of the targeted models becoming a victim. <p>2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Motor vehicle theft is often times a crime of opportunity. If a vehicle is left running and unattended, there is a strong likelihood of it being taken. If the vehicle is parked in a dark and isolated area, that would also be a good candidate for theft. 			

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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dodge and Jeep vehicles, particularly high end models, if kept on the street as opposed to a garage entice vehicle thieves who are able to utilize these vehicles for other crimes and elude law enforcement as well, due to the performance capabilities. • Often times when these vehicles are stolen there is glass left behind as that is the primary method of gaining access to the vehicles. • Stolen vehicles can be spotted on the street operating with some sort of make shift cover for the area where the original window was broken to gain access and take the vehicle. • Once access is gained to the vehicle typically screwdrivers and USB (Universal Serial Bus) cords are used to dismantle the steering columns and start the vehicle. • Re-programming devices are a primary tool used for theft of Dodge and Jeep vehicles. While no peeling of the steering column is required, windows are still broken to gain access to these types of vehicles.

In regards to Jeep and Dodge vehicles the cause is access to re-programming devices on the street. Strict regulation on these re-programming devices would help to prevent a large number of these thefts, and providing vehicle owners with the proper way to secure their vehicles and the knowledge to park in well-lit safe locations or even in a garage if possible. • Police Presence in the target area would help deter thieves as well.

Consider both quantitative and qualitative approaches.</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Statistics showed a 78 percent increase in motor vehicle thefts in the identified target area from 2023-2024. The goal is to see a decrease in a similar time frame going forward. If and when there is noticeable and consistent decrease throughout 2025, then we can re-evaluate and address the issue at that time. Ultimately in order to determine whether or not this priority has been addressed, we will need feedback from the community that lives in the area where this is occurring. We are able to get this feedback in a number of ways. These include beat meetings, monitoring of social media platforms, and other various community events. Over time we will be able to determine how safe the community feels that they will not fall victim to motor vehicle theft.

Be as specific as possible.</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> In recent years Reckless Driving and Large Vehicle gatherings have become a major issue for the 008th district. The three main locations are the Ford City Mall parking lot, the Pulaski Promenade parking lot and the intersection at 5000 S. Cicero. In 2024 there were 537 calls for service for drag racing and reckless driving along Pulaski and Cicero Ave. Compared to last year, there were 478 calls for service. This shows an increase and this issue continues to create an unsafe environment for pedestrians and motorists in the affected areas. This topic has been frequently brought up throughout the year at beat meetings both community conversations as well as other community events. 		
	Problem Analysis	<p>1. Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Reckless Driving and Large Vehicle gatherings are extremely dangerous. They are dangerous for the organizers of these illicit events, other motorists, pedestrians, cyclist and all others who get "caught" while attempting to travel on the road being targeted. These incidents often involve serious injury and even death by fatal crashes. 		
		<p>2. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Reckless Driving and Large Vehicle Gatherings or "Street Takeovers" as referred to on the street involve a large gathering of teens and young adults on the public way within the target area. The meetups are often initiated and facilitated via social media platforms. These large crowds meet at an area of the road within the target area and watch as cars drive recklessly, burning their tires causing visibility issues and noise issues from loud engine revving and block traffic, with a willful and wanton disregard for public safety. Motorcycles and other various all-terrain vehicles also participate in these illicit gatherings. And in many instances these individuals bring fireworks and are armed with handguns and rifles. There have been multiple incidents in the target are where firearms were pointed at 008th district officers by participants. There have been many instances of cars intentionally being set on fire as well. These incidents as a whole end up in significant property damage, injuries as a result of vehicle collisions, violence amongst the crowd and event death.



