Often times when these vehicles are stolen there is glass left behind as that is the prin method of gaining access to the vehicles. Stolen vehicles can be spotted on the street operating with some sort of make shift continue the area where the original window was broken to gain access and take the vehicle. Once access is gained to the vehicle typically screwdrivers and USB (Universal Serial cords are used to dismantle the steering columns and start the vehicle. In 2024 there were 537 calls for service for drag racing and reckless driving along Pulaski and C Ave. Compared to last year, there were 478 calls for service. This shows an increase and this is continues to create an unsafe environment for pedestrians and motorists in the affected areas.
