	Rationale <i>Explain why this is a top priority for your district. Provide specific numbers for calls for service and/or crime data to support your explanation. Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>Aggravated Batteries w/firearms is police reporting verbiage for people shot. This is a top priority because it affects the sanctity of life to the victims and the community. It is recognized that 30% of the shootings that have occurred in the 009th district from 01JAN24 to 24NOV24 are within the listed boundaries of Halsted (800W) -Hoyne (2100W), 43rd St (4300S) -55th St (5500S) - aka Back of the Yards. While there has been a slight reduction of people shot in the area (38% decrease from the same time period in 2023), further progress must be made to prevent this from leading to more violence in the area. Many of these shootings are drive-by shootings, a common gang method of violence, in which rival gang members - often wearing masks, approach in stolen vehicles and shoot at their perceived rivals. The victims as well as the offenders are generally young males ages 17-25.</p>			
Analysis	Problem Analysis <i>Explain the problem by describing each of the listed elements. Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s)?</i></p> <p>The community members living and visiting the area specifically (Ashland to Damen/43rd to 55th) have increasingly voiced their safety concerns at numerous meetings and events held within the area. This is a quality of life issue for many who live in the area and the City of Chicago. These shooting incidents are further highlighted when they are nationally publicized like the tragic shooting that occurred at the 5200 block of Damen in April of 2024, in which four children were struck by gunfire in a drive-by shooting while attending a family gathering. Most of the people shot incidents occur from 9pm to 5am and involve males between the ages of 17-25. Unfortunately, many of these young men lack structure and values in their lives to respect another life. The hope is that they find something to help them understand the inviolability of life and that every life matters.</p>			

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		<p>2. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include information). Include any demographic identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the attempt to flee the crime, how the scene of the crime, etc.</p> <p>While most of these shootings are drive-by shootings, in which the offenders shoot from the vehicle they use to flee, on some occasions the offenders approach on foot then escape in an awaiting vehicle nearby. Most offenders have been described as wearing dark clothing and masks when they commit said shootings. Another issue that affects the area's gun violence is when Gang members shoot at passing vehicles they suspect are occupied with rival gang members. These offenders then flee on foot through gangways and various unknown buildings. This situation creates safety concerns to all in the area from stray gunfire. Majority of these shooting occur after dusk when they feel darkness obscures their identity and aids their escape.</p>

	<p>Root Cause Analysis Identify potential root causes of the problem that, if mitigated, would prevent the problem from re-occurring. Be as specific as possible.</p>	<p>There are long-standing gang conflicts between rival factions situated to the north and south of 47th St. between Racine (1200W) and Hoyne (2100W). There have also been incidents in which outside gang factions exchange gunfire in the area. The constant threat of gun violence affects the residents of the community to withhold from engaging in neighborhood events - including CPD sponsored ones. Beat meetings for example are not well attended because residents are afraid to be seen conversing with law enforcement and appearing to be providing information on local gang members. This also hinders law enforcement's ability to gain credible information when shootings occur.</p>				
<p>Response</p>	<p>Response Strategy Describe the overall approach that will be taken to solve the problem, based on the Analysis completed above. Nonenforcement strategies must be included.</p>	<p><i>Non-enforcement response (required):</i></p> <p>Being that the root cause is a two-fold problem because it involves gang members who actively seek and participate in gun violence then hide in the cloak of anonymity due to witnesses being afraid to cooperate with police. Identifying the main gang members who are causing the problems is key to slowing down the violence. The 009th district intelligence officers, district coordinating officers, and the Back of the Yards Neighborhood Council will keep working together to identify, locate, and communicate with said members. Often times, these individuals reside at a nearby address where many of these problems stem from. 009th district CAPS officers and trouble building officers will work together to identify these problem buildings where the gang members tend to congregate. Once identified, Officers along with the city law department and alderman's office will use all legal means necessary to evict said members and close down the buildings. As for the</p>				

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	other portion of the problem, CAPS must continue its efforts to persuade community members to get involved in beat meetings.		
	91% of the aggravated batteries that have taken place in this area, occurred on 1st and 3rd watch (2:00 PM - 5:00 AM). These officers will be cognizant of Beat integrity during their tours of duty to ensure that coverage is maintained. Assistance will be requested from outside units when needed to supplement the district during busy time periods. Officers working the SDSC room, will run daily pod missions within the area during peak hours. Any information discovered during these missions will quickly be dispersed to the vehicles working within the district.		
Root Cause Mitigation <i>Explain how the Response Strategy directly addresses the root cause that was analyzed above.</i>	First off, even gang members need a place to stay. Unfortunately for them, they are more than likely unwanted neighbors. Many landlords have difficulty evicting these problem tenants and need the resources and information CAPS and Troubled Buildings can provide them. Increasing participation for the area Beat Meetings would substantially strengthen the trust between all stakeholders and The Chicago Police Department - together we can!

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>Comparison of 2023 and 2024 crime statistics of armed robberies with handguns has shown a 33% decrease in armed robberies happening in the 9th District. This shows that the strategies put forth from the 2024 strategic plan is having a positive effect. However, the district believes armed robberies are still having a negative effect within the community. 18% of the Armed Robberies with handguns are happening on the west side of the district. Data indicated that many of these crimes are occurring on 1st and 3rd watch (2:00pm-5:00am).</p>

Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <p>Robberies have shown to be a crime of opportunity. The offenders of these crimes are surprising their victims and are usually armed with handguns and/or rifles. The victims of these crimes are unfortunately targeted based on the opportunity of the offenders being able to quickly flee the scene.</p>

Include any attempt to flee the</p> <p>Offenders drive around (often in a stolen vehicle) in search of individuals who are alone or in a small group. The offenders drive up to the victim, one of the offenders stays in the driver's seat while the others exit the vehicle and approach the victim displaying handguns. Usually, one of them acts as a lookout while the others demand the victim's property. The offenders usually wear masks, gloves, and dark clothing to conceal their identities.</p>

Be as specific as possible.</p>	<p>These crimes occur near the boundaries of the 9th District and the adjoining 8th District - who use a different radio frequency, which can delay communications between the two districts. There are also multiple escape routes in this area which includes the Interstate I-55 expressway, Archer Ave, 55th Street/Garfield Blvd; all provide immediate relocation routes outside of the 9th District. Another factor is that a number of the victims in this area are non-English speaking which complicates communication with the responding officers and can delay pertinent information from being dispersed.</p>

Nonenforcement strategies must be included.</p>	<p><i>Non-enforcement response (required):</i></p> <p>As stated earlier, robberies are often a crime of opportunity because the victims usually are not aware of their surroundings nor that they are being followed. CAPS and DCO's will handout safety tip flyers and detective robbery alerts in the area and at Beat Meetings in an effort to remind people to be vigilant. Since many of these robberies take place in desolate locations we will encourage community members to point out and submit City Service Requests. Things like graffiti, abandoned vehicles, broken streetlights, overgrown shrubbery and light obscuring trees could deter potential armed robberies in the area. CAPS officers will partner with local Faith-based leaders to do Safety-Walks around the community. These walks will give CPD the ability to speak to community members who do not normally attend the beat meetings or other police community events. CAPS officers will be able to provide safety information to help community members avoid being victims of armed robberies.</p>
		<p><i>Enforcement response (if applicable):</i></p> <p>Due to the fact that many robberies involve stolen vehicles, the 009th District will utilize vehicles equipped with ALPR (license plate reader) technology along with SDSC pod (READS) cameras to locate stolen vehicles. Beat, Tactical, and District Coordinating Officers will remain vigilant in the area and in particular during the peak hours of the robberies. Spanish-English bilingual speaking officers will generally be assigned to the effected beats</p>

Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>Comparison of 2023 and 2024 crime statistics of Burglaries has shown a 5% decrease within the district over the past year. However, Community members have expressed concerns at events and beat meetings throughout the year about what they feel to be an uptick in the amount of burglaries in the area. The 009th district has found that 30% of all burglaries in the district occur within the listed boundaries; Wentworth-Ashland, Interstate 55-Pershing Rd. Most of these burglaries have occurred during the 1st watch tour of duty which is generally overnight hours (9pm-6am).</p>			
	Problem Analysis <i>Explain the problem by describing each of the listed elements. Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>7. Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <p>Both residential and commercial properties have fallen victim to the up rise in burglaries within the 9th District. However, commercial burglaries have had a greater influx recently and have established patterns that are occurring in other commercial areas throughout the city.</p>			

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		<p>8. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any attempt to flee the identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how th scene of the crime, etc.</p> <p>The 009th district DIO and detectives have discovered that there has been a larger presence of burglary teams coming into the district over the past year. A number of businesses along Archer Ave and within beats 913,914 and 915 have been victims of burglaries. Some businesses have unfortunately been victimized more than once. The offenders usually damage or break the front doors or windows of an establishment to gain entry then enter and remove cash, registers, liquor, cigarettes, lottery tickets or anything of value - smash and grab technique.
