Community Policing, DIOs, and DCOs will notify the Tactical Lieutenant upon receiving intelligence that a large gathering or an unauthorized party will occur. High visibility by the officers when conducting foot patrols and being in the areas most affected hopefully will assist in deterring crime in those areas.
