Analysis	Rationale	<p>Violent crime, specifically Shootings and Robberies are a top priority for to the 15th District. The District has seen an overall 9.5% decrease in shooting incidents YTD for the 2024 year (01JAN2024 - 28NOV2024) and the District has seen an overall 3.8% increase in Robbery incidents during the same time period.</p> <p>The below listed boundaries account for 20% of the districts shooting incidents YTD and 22% of the districts robbery incidents YTD. Within the Priority boundaries we have identified the specific locations of Madison and Leclaire, 4800 Block of Monroe, 4800 Block of Van Buren, Laramie and congress that serve as focus locations.</p>		
	Problem Analysis	<p>1. Who is / are the victim(s)?</p> <p>Shooting victims range from rival gang members from various gang factions, individuals selling narcotics, innocent members of the community, often robbery victims are also innocent members/ residents of the community.</p> <p>Robbery Victims range from ride share drivers, food delivery drivers, residents leaving/arriving to their homes, and people walking in the community.</p>		
		<p>2. Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information). Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc.</p> <p>Offender motives vary between Gang related, narcotics related, Robbery, and/or verbal altercations leading to gun violence. Gang and narcotic loitering in the area of concern increases the possibility of more gun violence.</p> <p>Offenders have been using vehicles during shooting and robbery incidents. In most incidents the vehicles used are stolen, either taken in a vehicular hi-jacking or stolen while unoccupied.</p>


