Be as specific as possible.</small>	District 020 has continued to see a considerable amount of thefts from vehicles, specifically the theft of catalytic converters. The 20th District saw a decrease in thefts from 2011's beat (77 incidents in year 2023 vs 64 incidents in year to date 2024), as well as a decrease in incidents on 2031's beat (60 incidents in year 2023 vs. 39 incidents in year to date in 2024). Even though there has been a decrease when compared to year 2023, the 20th District will continue their efforts to see decreases of incidents year after year.

		Victims are local residents who have parked in the area and who have experienced damage to their vehicles and items taken.

		Offenders have toured the area in vehicles and on foot to locate unsecured vehicles with property left in vehicles. In relation to catalytic converter thefts, offenders tour the area in vehicles and park along parked vehicles and exit with power tools and quickly remove the vehicle's catalytic converter and make good their escape.
