As a high priority concern, Narcotics sales, usage, loitering, etc. attribute to the violence that occurs within the district. These particular violations cause disruption in comfort, health, and quality of life in the 011th District. Due to the severity of the quality of life disruptions, we have developed multiple community missions throughout various beats. We will focus on specific targeted areas in East Garfield, West Garfield, North Lawndale, and West Humboldt park. Based on data and community input, there are 2 areas most affected by criminal activity. We will prioritize based on the frequency and criticality of criminal activity that takes place on beat 1112, which is leading in quality of life incidents. Secondary priorities will be in rank order 1121, 1132, and 1133.

The Field Lieutenant will conduct outdoor roll calls along with other related missions to reduce crime. The Tactical Lieutenant will utilize the Intradepartmental Service Request forms to request outside unit's assistance in areas where there are additional mitigating circumstances requesting assistance of Joint Agencies to also conduct various missions with ATF, FBI, DEA, IDOC and Bureau of Counterterrorism. Officers will enforce quality of life issues such as drinking in public and illegal parking in areas where large gatherings occur. Hot spots, gang loitering, and narcotics missions will be conducted on a continuous basis by tactical teams and watch personnel.</p> <p>Community Policing, DIOs, and DCOs will notify the Tactical and Watch Lieutenants upon receiving intelligence that a large gathering or an unauthorized party will occur. High visibility by the officers when conducting foot patrols and being in the areas most affected hopefully will assist in deterring crime in those areas.</p> <p>Officers on each watch will monitor the areas where the acts occur and enforce any law violations. Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>Beginning 01 Jan 25 to 01 Dec 25, homicides, aggravated assault with a firearm accounted for a major portion of violent incidents within the 011th district prior years. Currently, The district has seen a decrease in homicides and shootings but the violence is still occurring. There has also been an increase in criminal sexual assault throughout various beats in the 011th District during 2025.</p> <p>011 has 15 beats within our district and of those beats, we will focus heavily on the beats with higher crime with various initiatives such as missions, more police presence, community engagement collaborations with community stakeholders, organizations, faith based, businesses, and city agencies.</p> <p>We will focus on specific targeted areas in East Garfield, West Garfield, North Lawndale, and West Humboldt park. 
