During the period of 01 January 2025 - 11 December 2025 there were 91 shootings in the 15th District, a decrease of 16% from the same period the previous year. Beat 1532 has had 18 shootings from 01 January 2025 to 11 December 2025, a 12% increase from the same period last year. Shootings in Beat 1532 also account for 20% of the overall shootings year to date. Identified areas of concern for Beat 1532 are Maypole Ave. from Leclairre to Leamington, being a district gang/narcotics hot spot location (25/26-015-4&1-001) and also the 4900 blocks of west Ferdinand and Hubbard, being a district gang/narcotics hot spot location (25/26-015-4&1-002)

		Victims range from individuals that sell narcotics, individuals that are gang members of different gangs/ gang factions, innocent bystanders, and victims of robberies were offenders also shoot the victim.

		Methods include utilizing stolen vehicles to commit the shootings, utilizing food delivery services to lure in victims, and social media where videos are produce/posted purposely to initiate violence toward opposing gang factions and personal conflicts. Motives range between personal disputes, gang/narcotics related conflicts, domestic altercations, road rage, and robberies.

During the period of 01 January 2025 - 11 December 2025 there were 215 Robbery incidents in the 15th District, a decrease of 45% from the same period the previous year. Beat 1533 has had 42 Robbery incidents from 01 January 2025 to 11 December 2025, a 48% decrease from the same period last year. However, robberies in Beat 1533 account for 20% of the overall robberies s year to date, this being the beat with most robbery incidents. Identified areas of concern for Beat 1533 are Monroe Ave. from Cicero to Lavergne, being a district gang/narcotics hot spot location (25/26-015-4&1-003) and also the 5000 block of west Gladys , being a district gang/narcotics hot spot location (25/26-015-4&1-008)

Victims have stated that offenders often have high capacity ammunition firearms. Offenders often use food delivery services to schedule a food delivery and then commit the robbery when the driver arrives.</p>

During the period of 01 January 2025 - 11 December 2025 there were 1,990 calls for service related to narcotics sales, beat 1523 received 345 calls for service related to narcotics sales which equals 17%. During our yearly community conversations, this was a priority from respondents. The district has seen that many violent crime incidents have stemmed from narcotic sales. Identified areas of concern for Beat 1523 are 500 Block of north Central in the east ally being a district gang/narcotics hot spot location (25/26-015-4&amp;1-004) and also the area of Central to Pine, Corcoran to Fulton , being a district gang/narcotics hot spot location (25/26-015-4&amp;1-009)</p>


