Be as specific as possible.</i>	Based on 2025 crime data, the number of robberies in the 19th District has fallen over the year. At the time of this report, there has been a decrease of 28%, rounding up, from 2024; 261 incidents compared to 363 in 2024. The sectors most affected by robberies this year were 1910 and 1920, with 81 reported incidents in 1910 and 116 in 1920. The beats with the most reported incidents were 1924 (47) and 1925 (27). While overall, reported robberies were down, 194 had an increase of 12 incidents, up from 35 last year. Most robbery incidents continue to occur during the 1st watch (122), followed by the 3rd watch (94). The incidents continue to occur in and around the District's commercial, bar, and entertainment corridors near public transportation hubs, with offenders taking advantage of the heavy pedestrian traffic and potential intoxicated patrons.

Include any identified patterns such as motives, types of weapons used to commit the crime, how they attempt to flee the scene of the crime, etc</i></p> <p>The modus operandi for robbery offenders is usually to approach their victims on foot, then flee in vehicles or use public transportation, typically the CTA Red Line, to make good their escape. In addition to the L train, the offenders will use vehicles and travel down major thoroughfares, such as Lake Shore Drive, quickly fleeing the area after the incident. Another trend that has been occurring with some regularity is posing as ride-share drivers. During the commission of the offense, the offenders will produce or imply that they are armed. In other incidents, they use or threaten to use force to take items from their victims or from business establishments.</p>

Scanning	Rationale <i>Explain why this is a top priority for your district. Provide specific numbers for calls for service and/or crime data to support your explanation. Be as specific as possible.</i>	<p>At the time of this report, the 2025 crime data shows that while burglaries remain a high priority in the 019th District, the District is down overall compared to our total reported incidents in 2024. Overall, in 2025, there were 447 burglaries reported, compared to 619 in 2024, a 28% decrease. The 20 Sector saw the most incidents this year, with 184 burglaries reported, followed by the 30 Sector with 158, and lastly the 10 Sector with 105. There has been a significant drop off in the 10 sector, which had 203 incidents in 2024 and led all sectors in reported burglaries. Beat 1922 led all beats in the District with 54 reported burglaries, the same number as last year. Beats 1935 and 1924, followed by 45 and 39 reported burglaries, respectively. Most incidents occurred during the First Watch (203), followed by the Third Watch (126) and the Second Watch (122). These burglaries occur across the district, in both business corridors and residential neighborhoods. There are many major streets, public transportation hubs, and access to major expressways, which offer quick egress from the area. Due to the 019th District being home to many businesses, including restaurants, bars, and venues, which tend to be located close to one another on arterial streets, offenders have quick access to multiple establishments, with a convenient means of making their escape.</p>

They often survey neighborhoods and conduct "soft checks" by pulling on residential or garage doors and windows to determine whether they are unsecured. Offenders also employ multiple escape methods, fleeing on foot, by bicycle, or in vehicles.</p>

Non-enforcement strategies must be included.</i></p>	<p><i>Non-enforcement response (required):</i> The non-enforcement response will involve the 19th District Community Policing Office hosting home-safety seminars, collaborating with block clubs and neighborhood organizations through ongoing beat meetings, and collaborating with local businesses to enhance their security measures and implement best practices to reduce the likelihood of being a target.</p> <p><i>Enforcement response (if applicable):</i> The 19th District Watch personnel will maintain beat integrity and conduct foot patrols throughout the retail areas within their assigned beats. Tactical Teams will carry out regular burglary missions during their shifts, focusing on locations experiencing increased burglary activity. The District Mission Team will adjust its hours to align with emerging burglary patterns, and District Bike Teams will proactively patrol affected areas to enhance police presence.</p> <p>Additionally, 19th District personnel will continue to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provide beat officers with updated information on retail corridor locations within their beats • Increase high-visibility patrols by uniformed officers • Conduct systematic patrols of retail corridors using beat cars • Give special attention during key periods such as openings, closings, and high-volume times • Increase foot patrols • Conduct traffic missions in affected areas • Utilize the automatic license plate reader (ALPR) vehicle • Perform CTA station checks and ride CTA trains • Assign Day Bike Teams to focus on retail establishments, while Night Bike Teams concentrate on entertainment venues • Maintain consistent communication and relationships with retail businesses, sharing best practices, providing accurate crime-trend information, and ensuring business contact information is kept current in department databases.
	<p>Root Cause Mitigation <i>Explain how the Response Strategy directly addresses the root cause that was analyzed above</i></p>	<p>The District's combined enforcement and non-enforcement strategies aim to address the root causes of these incidents by educating residents on home safety, security, and situational awareness. Collaboration with neighborhood organizations, business owners, chambers of commerce, and local elected officials will help empower community members to look out for their own safety and that of their neighbors. Coordinating with City Services will ensure adequate lighting in vulnerable areas. Initiatives such as positive loitering events, outdoor roll calls, and targeted burglary missions will further deter criminal activity. Remaining flexible and adjusting Tactical and RBT mission teams in response to emerging crime trends will help address underlying issues and support the successful apprehension of offenders.</p>

Be as specific as possible.</i>	At the time of this report, shootings in the 19th District have fallen by 50%. 2025 crime data shows that the district has had 11 reported shootings, compared to 22 in 2024. The 10 Sector, which saw the most incidents last year, has had only 1 incident so far this year. The 30 sector leads the district in 2025 with 7 shootings, followed by the 20 Sector with 3. However, the most gang and narcotic-related incidents, which are a strong indicator of where shootings may occur, are still located in the 10 sector. Most incidents occurred during the First Watch (5), followed by the Third Watch (4) and the Second Watch (2).


