CHICAGO POLICE DEPARTMENT: JUNE 2025 IN REVIEW

CPD Announces Department Efforts, Citywide Crime Statistics for June 2025





This June was a time of mourning, as the Chicago Police Department grieved the heartbreaking loss of Officer Krystal Rivera (E.O.W. June 5, 2025), a courageous and compassionate officer who devoted her career to helping others and protecting our city.

The Chicago Police Department is grateful for the outpouring of support from here at home and across the country. The entire Department will forever be inspired by the legacy of Officer Rivera and her service and sacrifice will never be forgotten.

"Officer Krystal Rivera exemplified the very best qualities of a Chicago Police Department officer," said Superintendent Larry Snelling. "She understood what it took to go out and keep people safe in this city. The example she set is not just an example for Chicago, it's an example for the entire world."

This month, CPD also hosted an Emergency Assistance Center at St. Sabina Church to support individuals and families affected by recent violence. Community members received access to vital services, including crime victim compensation, youth support, domestic violence resources, confidential counseling and the opportunity to speak directly with detectives.

The Area One and Area Two Family Liaison Offices hosted their annual Garden of Life event this month, bringing together CPD members, survivors and families to honor loved ones lost to violent crime. Participants planted flowers as a living tribute and a promise to stand in solidarity with survivors and their families.

The first week of June is Law Enforcement Civilian Personnel Appreciation Week. The Department recognized civilian members and their hard work in roles such as Community Organizers, Crime Victim Advocates and a Bureau of Detectives Staff Assistant who is one of CPD's longest-serving members with 47 years on the job. These civilians work alongside sworn members to strengthen public safety and community trust, and their work is vital to the Chicago Police Department.

JUNE 2025 CRIME STATISTICS

- Citywide, there were 34 murders this month, down 50% compared to the 68 murders last June, and the lowest monthly total since June 2014. In comparison to last June, shooting incidents are down 52%, and there's a 54% drop in the number of shooting victims.
- Over the first half of the year, there have been 188 homicides, a 32% drop year to date and the lowest since 2014. Compared to last year, there's a 39% drop in shooting incidents and a 41% decline in shooting victims.
- Through June, the Bureau of Detectives has cleared a total of 153 homicides.
- Based on Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) figures, overall Part I crimes have fallen 14% year to date and 19% month to date. Violent crime is down 23% both month to date and year to date, while property crime has dropped 11% over last year and 18% month to date.
- Overall robberies are down 23% month to date, with a 33% year to date decline. Robberies with a firearm have dropped 34% in comparison to last June and 42% for the year.
- Motor vehicle thefts are down 29% this month and 28% year to date. There's a 13% decline in burglaries compared to June 2024, with a 20% year to date drop.
- Since the start of the year, the city has recorded 244 vehicular hijackings, down 49% compared to this time in 2024. Officers have made 776 motor vehicle-related arrests, including 106 for felony vehicular hijacking.
- Officers recovered 954 firearms this month an average of nearly 32 firearms each day and 5,513 firearms since the start of 2025.
