


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Chicago Police 13-period years. Unless otherwise noted, tabulations are based on reports for 28-day, 13-period years. The Department's first 13-period year was 1964 (a leap year), that began 9 January 1964 and ended 6 January 1965. The year 1965 ended 5 January 1966, and the year 1966 ended 4 January 1967. Ending dates for individual 28-day periods appear in Table 3.

The Chicago Police uses the 13-period year because each period and year (1) contains the identical number of days, (2) begins on the same weekday and ends on the same weekday, and (3) contains the same number of normal peak workload days (Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays).

Tabulations based on the 12-month calendar year (1 January to 31 December) are presented where data related to FBI, City of Chicago or certain other reports.

Certain data is tabulated for both 13-period and 12-month years because the figures are not fully comparable. The 12-month year 1964 had 366 days and the 12-month years 1965 and 1966 had 365 days, whereas all 13-period years had only 364 days. Yearly totals also differed when unusually high (or low) figures were recorded during the first days of January.

Index and Part I crimes. Index crimes, selected by the FBI for use in making comparisons among various jurisdictions of the nation, are: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Theft \$50 and Over, and Auto Theft.

Part I crimes include all Index crimes plus Manslaughter by Negligence, Non-Aggravated Assault, and Theft Under \$50.

Revisions. Figures for 1964 and 1965 reported in the Department's **1965 Statistical Report** have been revised to reflect certain year-end corrections and improvements in data-reporting procedures.

INTRODUCTION

Crimes reported. 1966 brought a rise in Index crimes throughout the nation. The national increase was 11%, over twice the 5.2% increase in 1965. In Chicago, the crime rate rose 4.9%. Though the Chicago increase was less than half the national average, it represented a reversal from decreases in foregoing years; in 1965 there had been a decrease of 11.9%, and in 1964 a decrease of 3.1%.

Clearances. The rate of clearance for all index crimes reported in Chicago was 37.2%. This rate compares favorably with a nationwide average of 25%. Individual Chicago rates that were markedly higher than corresponding nationwide rates included: Theft \$50 and Over, 26.3% (U.S. 14%); Burglary, 34.2% (U.S. 23%); Auto Theft, 30.4% (U.S. 25%); and Robbery, 39.4% (U.S. 35%).

Criminal arrests. Arrests for all Part 1 crimes increased 6.2% over the previous year. Among these arrests for Homicide increased 27.2%, Rape 12.5%, Theft 10.4%, and Auto Theft 11.0%.

Crimes by youth. Persons under 25 accounted for 61.9% of all Part 1 crime arrests. For persons under 18, arrestees were:

40.9% for all Part 1 crimes, 49.4% for Robbery, 57.8% for Burglary, 51.8% for Theft, and 52.9% for Auto Theft.

Staff functions. Services of staff units continued to expand. Radio calls from the Communications Center rose to 4.1 million. Owing to computerizing of the "hot desk" facility, field inquiries totalled over 750,000. Other examples: Over 19,000 fingerprints were compared to latent prints obtained at crime scenes. Over 59,000 vehicles were removed from the city's streets; monies received for cars towed away, stored or sold totalled \$1.2 million. Department vehicles travelled over 54 million miles; average costs, including accidents, were only 4-1/4¢ per mile. Department personnel received a total of over 150,000 man-days of training. Over 57,000 citizens toured Department facilities; and replies to citizen requests for information totalled over 200,000.

Department resources. Expenditures totalled over \$103 million, of which over \$96 million, or 93.6% were spent for salaries. The total number of personnel was 13,940, an increase of 6.0% over 1965. The number of patrolmen increased by 8.8%, policewomen by 59.0%, and cadets by 21.7%.






7. Clearance Rates: Chicago and Nationwide Percentages, Index Crimes*



8. All Arrests by Percentages





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


