

1968 IN REVIEW

The number of major crimes committed against persons in Chicago during 1968 was 1.2% lower than in 1967. However, the number of crimes committed against property in 1968 was 4.9% higher than the previous year, and the total number of major* crimes against persons and property was up 4.1%.

Chicago again had the lowest traffic fatality rate among the nation's five largest cities. The city's rate was 3.3 per 10,000 registered vehicles. The number of traffic fatalities in the city went up from 306 in 1967 to 340 in 1968 (23)†.

In 1968, the city experienced serious civil disorders on two occasions. As a result, the Department faced responsibilities which placed a heavy burden upon its resources and manpower as the number of index crimes increased.

Major crimes increased after the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., on April 4th, and during the period which included the Democratic National Convention in August (3). Extra man-hours required for handling the April and August disturbances totaled over 1,250,000 (15).

The number of major crimes leveled off for the remainder of the year after August and from that point the total was well below the 1967 rate.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

To meet the needs of the people of Chicago, the Department expanded police services throughout its various units, particularly in the Community Service Division during 1968. In June, Officers Friendly in each district completed their first year, having visited 280,000 school children from kindergarten through 3rd grade (22). In September, the program was expanded to include visits with older children (4th through 8th grades), thereby involving an additional 700,000 boys and girls.

Citizen attendance at Police-Community Workshops and other district station meetings to discuss community programs and problems totaled 105,708, an increase of 31% over the previous year. The number of citizen calls and suggestions regarding neighborhood problems handled by District Community Service Units was 8,078 more than double the number received in 1967 (22).

As part of the Mayor's "Reach Out Program" to provide recreation and jobs for the city's youth, district-sponsored activities involved over 320,000 children between 8 and 18 years old. In addition, more than 2,600 youths over 16 years old were aided in obtaining productive employment. Activities conducted by the districts included educational, cultural and recreational programs.

OTHER FIELD SERVICES

The number of district tactical units was increased from 31 to 53 and the personnel strength of the Gang Intelligence Section from 38 to 200 men.

The CTA Section of the Task Force, established at the end of 1967, was expanded to 200 men. The unit made over 1,100 arrests, effecting a reduction of 35% in the number of reported incidents (16).

In May 1968, the Mayor announced the consolidation of the marine and helicopter units of the Chicago Police and Fire Departments to provide more efficient service. The city now has four helicopters and 14 boats available for both police and fire duty.

Under a new special employment program inaugurated in 1968, the available manpower in the districts was increased by officers working extra tours of duty on their days off and during their furloughs.

The Department's school absentee and curfew violation programs were increased during 1968 (19). Fingerprinting and photographing of juveniles arrested on felony charges, particularly those involving the unlawful possession or use of firearms were instituted as regular procedure. More than 4,200 firearms were recovered, of which over 2,300 were obtained in conjunction with arrests.

STAFF SERVICES

Ground was broken for a new First Area and 2nd District (Wabash Avenue) headquarters complex at 51st Street and Wentworth Avenue. The new structure will include two courtrooms and a 150-seat auditorium. A heliport and an auto and radio maintenance center, to replace a rented facility on South Indiana Avenue, will be constructed adjacent to the headquarters building. Construction of an addition to the 6th District station (Gresham) was also begun.

Police call boxes, redesigned for use by citizens -- without locks -- were painted blue and installed at strategic subway locations and in the 11th (Fillmore) and 2nd Districts (Wabash Avenue).

The Communications Center received 3,261,739 P05-1313 calls in 1968, an increase of 8% from 3,015,292 in 1967. Cars dispatched in response to initial emergency calls totaled 1,942,599 in 1968, an increase of 5% from 1,848,541 in 1967 (25).

Computer inquiries regarding stolen autos increased 31% during 1968. During the first full year of Department linkage to the FBI's computer at the National Crime Information Center in Washington, D.C., 481 positive identifications were obtained via Department terminals (26).

Total man-hours of training given to members by the Department increased 45% from 86,426 to 125,579. Of this total, the man-hours of recruit training increased over 150% from 34,395 to 88,441 (34).

Members of all ranks participated in training programs. Included were 65 exempt and selected personnel who took a five month course in administrative development at the University of Illinois Circle Campus. Over 950 officers took courses in law enforcement at Chicago City College.

OTHER DATA

Expenditures in 1968 totaled over \$129,000,000 of which \$121,000,000 or 94.0% was spent for salaries (38). The total number of personnel was 15,082, an increase of 3.2% (40). Top salary rates for patrolmen rose more than 8%; for others there were increases of approximately 5% (39). Among 1968 promotions: 156 patrolmen became sergeants, 46 sergeants became lieutenants, and 16 lieutenants became captains.

TYPES OF DATA PRESENTED

The tabulations and graphs that follow give quantitative data on crimes reported, on arrests and other results of members' performance, and on resources made available to the Department.

Figures for crimes reported conform to FBI practice in its Uniform Crime Reports. Data on Murder, Rape and Aggravated Assault reflect the number of victims when two or more are involved in an incident. Data on Auto Theft show the number of cars stolen. Data on Robbery, Burglary and Theft - \$50 and Over show the number of incidents. In the data on arrests, all figures reflect the number of offenders apprehended.

The base of reporting for the data is identified as either the 12-month calendar year or the 13-period Chicago Police year. Differences in resultant figures may be seen by comparing Tables 1 and 2 and Tables 5 and 6.

12-MONTH YEARS

The 12-month calendar year (1 January to 31 December) is used where the data relates to FBI, City of Chicago and certain other reports. The year 1967 had 365 days; 1968, a leap year, had 366.

13-PERIOD YEARS

The 13-period year is used so that valid comparisons can be made according to workload. Each of the 13 periods has 28 days and each of the four weeks in a period begins on the same day of the week. As a result, each week and period, with the same number of days, has the same number of Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, when peak workloads occur. Ending dates for each period in 1966, 1967 and 1968 are shown in Table 3.

Adjustment week. Beginning 9 January 1964, there were four normal 13-period years of 52 weeks, or 364 days. The year 1968, however, had 53 weeks. An "adjustment week" was added to the normal 13th period so that in the forthcoming year 1969 both 31 December and 1 January — peak workload days — may again be included.

Separate 1968 figures for the first 52 weeks and the adjustment week are given in the tables. Three kinds of year-to-year comparisons can therefore be made.

Comparing first 52 weeks only. If it is desired to compare corresponding calendar days, the first 52 weeks of 1968 may be used as a base of comparison with 13-period 1967 provided that allowance is made for the slight shift of calendar days. A comparison of 52-week 1968 with 12-month 1967 data may also be made if allowance is made for the somewhat greater shift of calendar days and the addition of two days.

Comparing prorated 52-week average of 53 weeks. More precise year-to-year comparisons can be made if figures for the adjustment week are reflected in the data. By adding figures for the first 52 weeks and the adjustment week and then multiplying by 0.981 (52/53) a prorated 52-week average may be obtained. Such prorated figures differ appreciably from those of the first 52 weeks when unusually high (or low) figures appear in the adjustment week data. Prorated averages are shown in Tables 2 and 4.

Rewards. Figures for 1967 reported in the Department's 1967 Annual Report have been revised to reflect certain year-end corrections and improvements in data-reporting procedures.





12-month year 1968. U.S. data based on FBI advance estimates.






1968 Index Crime Arrests
