#### 1969 IN REVIEW

The number of index crimes\* reported in Chicago during 1969 was 7.2% greater than in 1968. Among the seven index crimes, Robbery increased by 13.0%, Murder by 10.5%, Auto Theft by 8.3%, and Rape by 7.8% (6) $\dagger$ . According to the FBI, Chicago's per capita rate for index crimes is the second lowest among the six largest U. S. cities (adjoining chart).

The number of traffic fatalities in Chicago was the same in 1969 as in 1968 (24). The fatality rate per 10,000 registered vehicles was 3.2, representing a decrease from a 3.3 rate in 1968.

#### Community Services

During the summer months the Department again expanded its district youth activities, participating with some seventy other agencies in the Mayor's Reach Out program (22). Among newly introduced activities were a city-wide pentathlon and judo classes for both boys and girls. Nearly 300 officers were assigned to the summer's activities.

Officers Friendly completed their first school year of visits to pupils in the upper grades, 4th through 8th. In the autumn, officers began making visits to high schools. "Let's Work Together," a new film describing the work of community service sergeants, was made available for public showings.

A new type of foot patrol, called "walk and talk," was undertaken in December by members of the Task Force. Under the program, teams of officers are assigned to neighborhoods to reduce crime, protect citizens and improve police-community relations. As they walk, the officers make frequent stops to discuss community problems with citizens on the street.

Preparations were made, at the year's end, for the hiring and training of over 400 neighborhood residents to serve as community aides under the Model Cities program.

#### Other Field Services


Combined foot and vehicular patrol was introduced on certain beats in three of the districts. Under this program, called "neighborhood patrol," one of two men assigned to the beat patrols a selected route on foot. He carries a portable radio to maintain contact with his partner. Each of the men patrols four hours on foot, four hours in the squad car.

District tactical teams, which provide specialized patrol coverage in the districts and can also be quickly mobilized to participate in Task Force missions, completed their second full year of this type of service. The number of tactical teams was increased from 53 to 58 (15).

A seaport security unit with 80 members of the Department was set up midyear. The nine sergeants of the Task Force Helicopter section logged a total of 1,676 flying hours in their first full year of operations.

With the opening of the CTA Rapid Transit line in the Dan Ryan expressway, personnel in the Task Force CTA section were increased by 38.0% from 171 to 236. Arrests by members of this section were increased by over 800%. Arrests by members of the Canine section almost doubled (18).

The number of strikes handled by the Labor Relations section increased 9.6% from 98 to 102. The number of locations involved, however, rose to 870 from the previous year's already high number of 372.

Special deployment of police personnel to handle civil demonstrations increased 69.5% from 45,000 to over 77,000 man-hours (16). However, there was a steep decline of 92.0% in deployments for major disturbances from well over a million to only 100,000 man-hours.

Violations for school absenteeism more than doubled, rising from 15,000 to 31,000 (19). Curfew violations increased over 50% from 45,000 to 68,000. Referrals to Juvenile Court increased 24.4% from 13,000 to 17,000.

The Department announced its participation in a detoxification program for alcoholics. Under this program, a person picked up by police for habitual drunkenness has the opportunity to accept medical treatment rather than arrest.

#### Staff Services

The number of police call boxes refurbished and and made available for citizen use on CTA platforms and at other locations was increased from 58 to 261. It is planned to have over 1,000 for citizen use throughout the city. The number of positive identifications received from the NCIC computer in Washington, D. C.

increased 217.8% from 481 to 1,529 (26). The LETS teletype system was phased out in favor of the computerized LEADS system.

The total monetary yield from property taken into custody increased 60.4% from \$232,000 to \$373,000. Cash returned to owners increased 73.5% from over \$150,000 to over \$262,000 (28). City income from the sale, towing and storage of abandoned vehicles increased 43.9% from less than \$1 million to almost \$1\frac{1}{2}\$ million (31).

The course of training for recruits was lengthened from 14 weeks to 31 weeks. The program is managed by a joint Chicago Police and City College faculty. It includes 12 semester hours of college-accredited courses in social sciences in addition to technical police subjects. Because of the greatly lengthened training program, the probationary period was lengthened from six to twelve months.

#### Other Data

The budget for 1969 totaled over \$157 million, of which over \$148 million was spent for salaries (38). For 1970 the budget was increased to over \$190 million and salary expenditures to over \$180 million. Top salary rates for patrolmen rose more than 16% in 1969 (39). For 1970 an increase of 10% was budgeted for all police officers and crossing guards, a 2% longevity increase after five years' service was also provided. Effective 1 January 1969 the City of Chicago assumed payment of employees' individual hospital insurance.

1969 promotions included 82 patrolmen advanced to sergeant rank, 19 sergeants to lieutenant rank, and 15 lieutenants to captain rank.

#### TYPES OF DATA PRESENTED

The tabulations and graphs that follow give quantitative data on crimes reported, on arrests and other results of members' performance, and on resources made available to the Department.

Figures for crimes reported conform to FBI practice in its Uniform Crime Reports. Data on Murder, Rape and Aggravated Assault reflect the number of victims when two or more are involved in an incident. Data on Auto Theft show the number of cars stolen. Data on Robbery, Burglary and Theft — \$50 and Over show the number of incidents. In the data on arrests, all figures reflect the number of offenders apprehended.

The base of reporting for the data is identified as either the 12-month calendar year or the 13-period Chicago Police year, which consists of 13 periods, each with 28 days. Differences in resultant figures may be seen by comparing Tables 1 and 2 and Tables 5 and 6.

#### 12-MONTH YEARS

The 12-month calendar year (1 January to 31 December) is used where the data relates to FBI, City of Chicago and certain other reports. The year 1968, a leap year, had 366 days and 1969 had 365.

#### 13-PERIOD YEARS

The 13-period year is used so that valid comparisons can be made according to workload. Each of the 13 periods has 28 days and each of the four weeks in a period begins on the same day of the week. As a result, each week and period, with the same number of days, has the same number of Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, when peak workloads occur.

Figures for 1968 presented here cover the 364 days from 4 January through 1 January 1969. Those for 1969 cover the same number of days from 9 January 1969 through 7 January 1970. Ending dates for individual periods of each 13-period year are shown in Table 3.

Adjustment week. Figures for the intervening week, 2 January 1969 through 8 January 1969, are not included in the 1969 Annual Report. These seven days were an "adjustment week" added to the normal 52 weeks of 1968 so that in the subsequent year 1969 both 31 December and 1 January — peak workload days — could again be included. Figures for the adjustment week, presented separately, were included in the 1968 Annual Report so that a continuous record would be available.










#### 1969 Index Crime Arrests






