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SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

In 1973, Chicago retained its reputation as the safest of the three major cities (population of one million or over) with the lowest number of traffic accident fatalities per 10,000 registered vehicles. Chicago's traffic accident death rate per 10,000 registered vehicles showed a slight increase over the previous year.

In 1973, the department successfully tested in the 19th District a mobile terminal within the squad car hooking up the man on the beat with Chicago, state, and federal criminal information systems.

Created and coordinated with our Case Reporting Crime Statistics System, a successful query and response postal card automated mailing system to gauge public satisfaction with Police service.

Installed and tested the first two of an eventual 37 outlying and Detective Area and Auto Pound terminal system. The first two installed were at the 19th District and Area 6 Headquarters. These will give remote Police units direct inquiry into the criminal data bank thereby eliminating telephone inquiries to Field Inquiry.

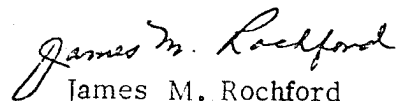
Instituted an IBM keypunch replacement (key to tape) conversion at Traffic Records (Summons System) to automate and make more efficient data entry of traffic summons.

The year 1973 was a year of challenge for the Chicago Police Department. The effects of the Chicago Police Department's continuing efforts to serve and protect the citizens of Chicago are presented in this Statistical Summary.

Chicago experienced its first increase in major crime in four years during 1973-an increase of 8.6% compared to the previous year. This increase was realized despite the fact that members of the Patrol Division effected 7,217 more index crime arrests in 1973 than the previous year-an increase of 27.5%.

Increases in crime in any major city are based upon numerous factors. Changes in personnel, economic stability and the cultural mores of new residents to a community, all bear heavily upon a major city's crime statistics.

Despite an increase in index crime, Chicago ranked third lowest in the index crime rate per 1,000 population in cities of one million or more population according to Federal Bureau of Investigation statistics released 27 December 1973.

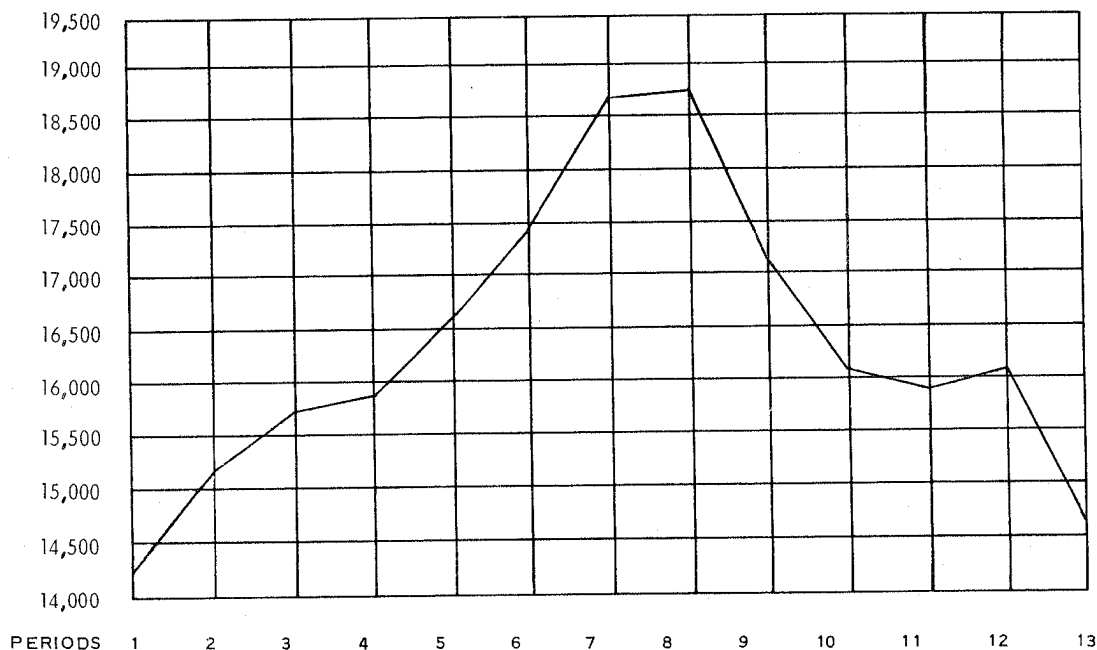

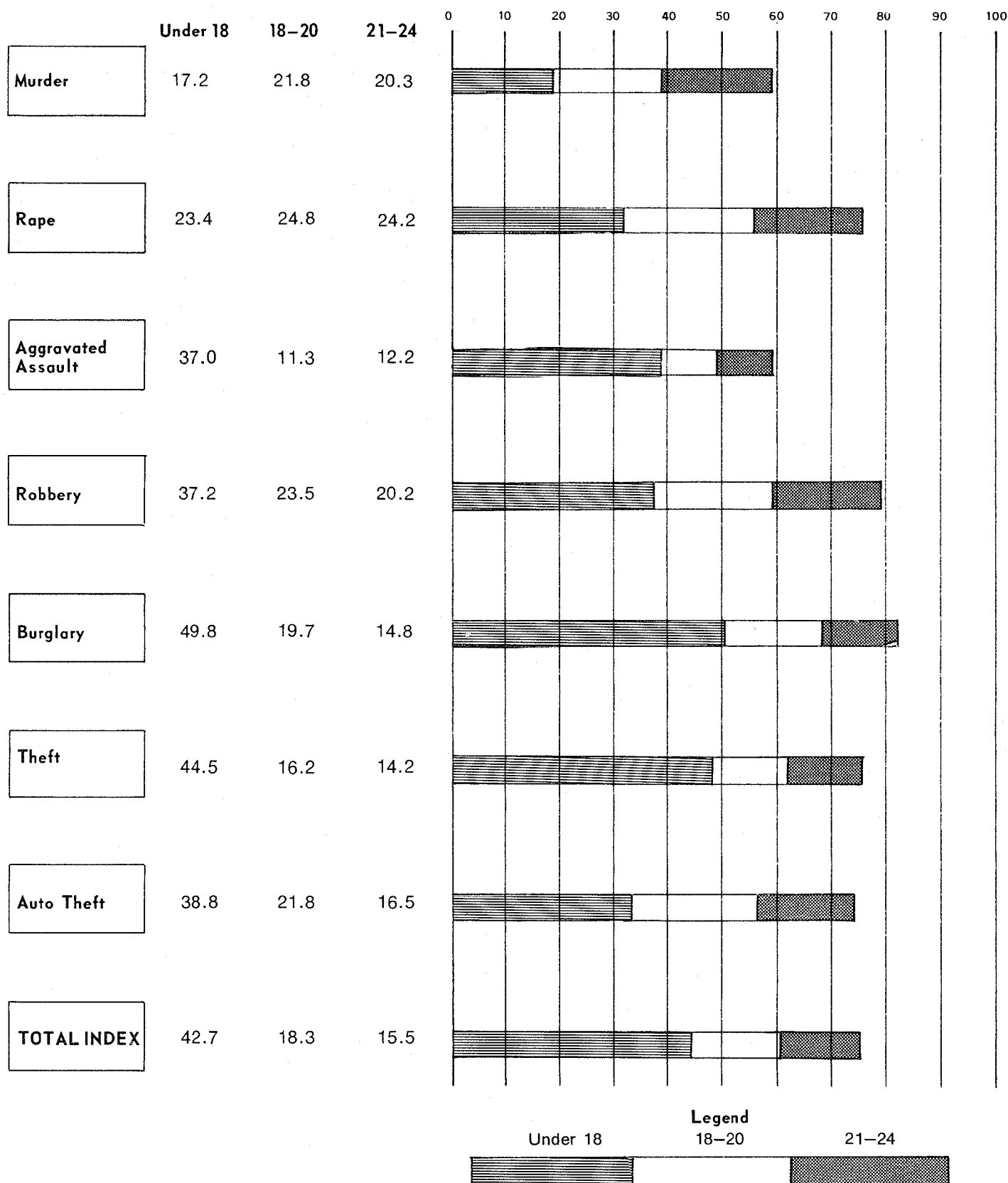
