

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

The year 1974 was a year of innovation in the Chicago Police Department. A summary of these innovations is presented below, followed by statistics concerning the activities of the Department.

Perhaps the most important development during the year was the formation and activation of the Office of Professional Standards. This unit, composed of some 30 civilian investigators headed by three administrators, is the first of its kind in the United States. The Office of Professional Standards is responsible for investigating all complaints of excessive force and certain allegations against Department members, as directed by the Superintendent of Police. To aid in ensuring objectivity, completed cases are reviewed by an independent organization, the Chicago Commission on Human Relations.

After an absence of 26 years, mounted patrol returned to Chicago. The new Mounted Patrol Unit, which commenced operations in July, patrols Chicago's "Loop" area and the major parks of the city. Public acceptance of this unit has been enthusiastic.

The special nature of police work may at times generate pressures affecting an officer's personal life, and personal problems may in turn have a detrimental effect on job performance. To deal with such situations, a full-time professional counselor was added to the Department's staff in 1974. This counselor is available to all Department members, for discussion of problems on an individual, confidential basis.

1974 also brought the creation of the Psychiatric Advisory Board. Composed of three psychiatrists, the board diagnoses and recommends treatment for officers who may be suffering from emotional or psychological instability.

The installation of computer terminals in all district stations and area investigative units was completed during 1974. These terminals enable officers to obtain data on wanted persons, stolen vehicles, and other stolen property from the Chicago, Springfield, and FBI computers, with speed and accuracy unapproached by previous, manual methods. Additionally, mobile terminals have been ordered. When they are installed in beat cars, investigative capability will be enhanced still further, and valuable radio time will be released for higher priority usage, such as calls for service from citizens.

Field personnel in a large police department sometimes feel isolated from the planning which is done at headquarters. To deal with this feeling of isolation, and to obtain valuable input from police officers and supervising sergeants at the operating level, the Field Planning Review Committee was instituted. This committee, consisting entirely of police officers and supervising sergeants at the operating level, reviews proposals effecting field operations and offers constructive feedback for improving these proposals.

Operation Stop-Crime was launched in the latter part of the year. Conceived as a tool for fighting crime on public transportation facilities, Operation Stop-Crime has been notably successful: serious crime on the CTA was reduced by half, as compared to the previous year.

Official FBI figures for 1974 disclose that, among the 56 largest cities in the United States, 38 experienced more crime per capita than Chicago. We are proud of our record and will continue to make every effort to provide the citizens of Chicago with the best police service possible.




