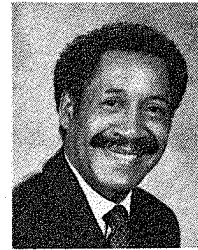

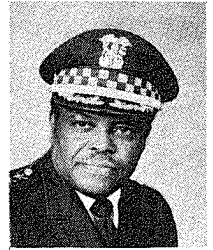

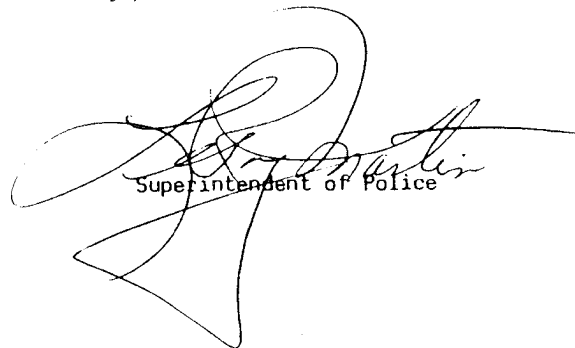
Dear Mayor Sawyer:

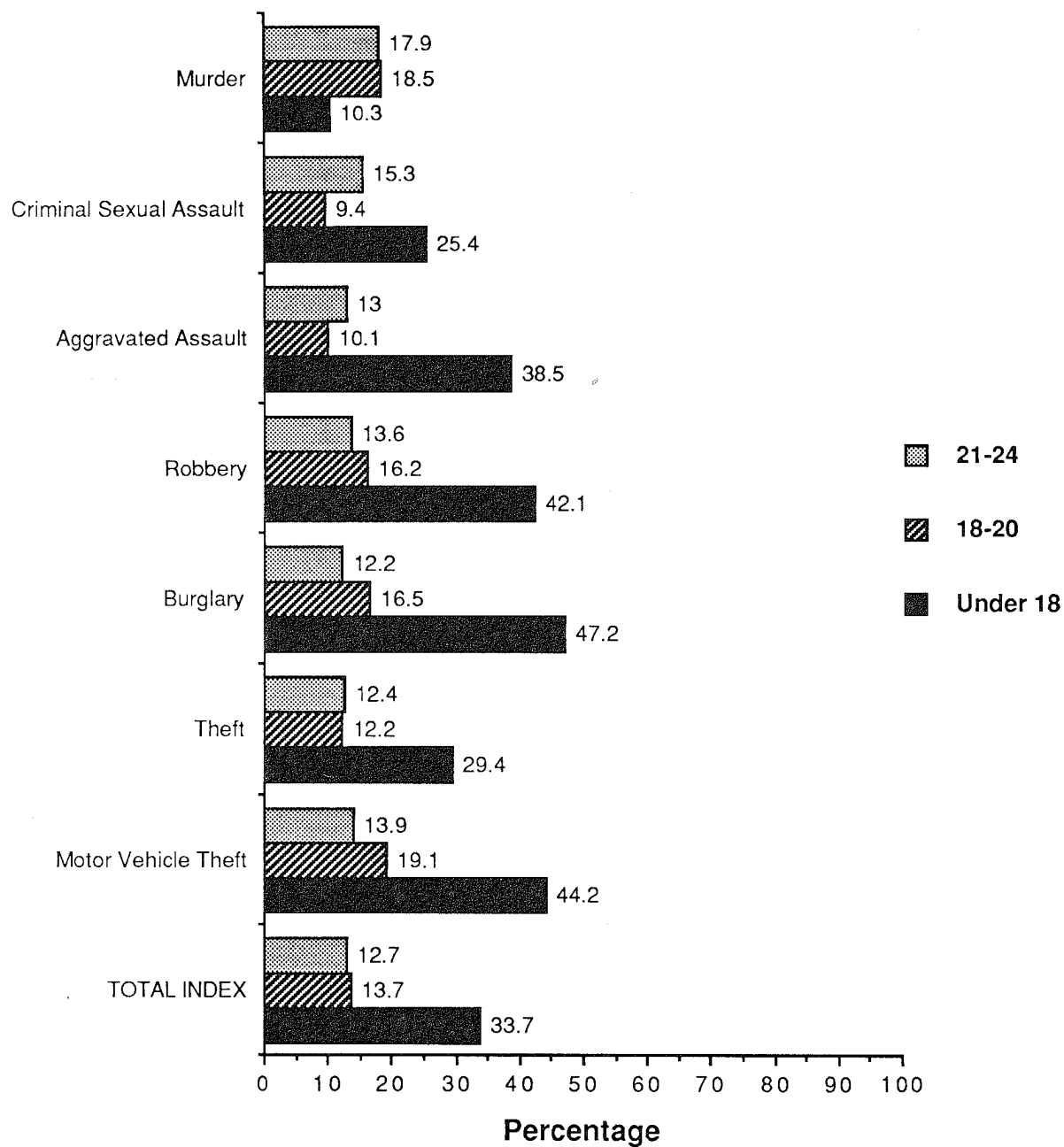
